Indonesia 2032 will be the catalyst for an entire generation in Indonesia, in Asia and the World, where we show how a city like Jakarta is able to reinvent itself by embracing technology, sustainability and a consideration for our future generations, through our actions of today.

Our games concept focuses on three pillars: the Environment, Legacy and Technology.

As it stands today, more than 95 percent of the required venues to host an Olympic and Paralympic Games are existing facilities, thus requiring no purpose-built venues for the games.

We have an award-winning public transport network that you will read more about later, which will serve the spectators, fans and delegations in a seamless manner.

We will have an advanced technology spectator experience plan. Harnessing tools such as augmented reality and real time analytics to deepen the fan experience, in person, or indeed from anywhere in the world.

And amidst all this, we will be a net-zero emissions games.

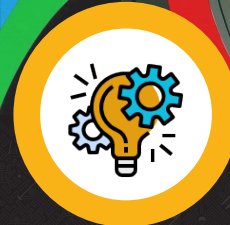
Indonesia is committed to the long game. We will progress over the next decade to a green, circular economy and are embracing electric vehicles across our public transport networks as well as private mobility.

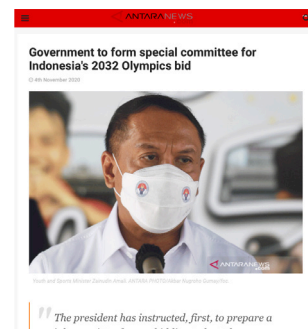
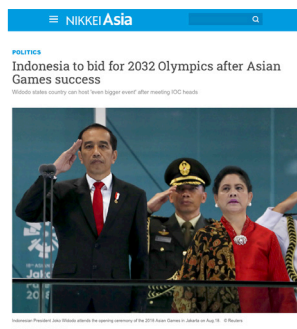
Following that public declaration, our President has backed that intent with a series of actions. These include a formal letter from the President's office, declaring formally Indonesia's willingness to host the 2032 Games and the forming of an official future Olympic Games Bidding Committee.

Preliminary feasibility studies, legal preparations, lobbying and socialization works were conducted in 2019, to ensure our readiness to bid and to host the 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games.

As the follow-up to the 2018 announcement, on November 4th 2020, the President announced the formation of special committee to bid for 2032 Olympics. We can count Mr Erik Thohir, the Minister of State-Owned Enterprises, and an IOC Member, amongst the members of the steering committee.

You will read later all the commitments from various levels of government to ensure a well-backed bid that has the support and feedback opportunities from the people of Indonesia.

Indonesia is ready to bid: all necessary requirements and formalities, works and studies needed to be done, will start immediately.

The Asian Games were hosted by more than one city for the first time. Indonesia only had 4 years to prepare as opposed to the usual 6 after Vietnam pulled out in 2014. Massive works were required to upgrade and build the necessary infrastructure and supporting facilities, amount to USD3,2B.

THE LEGACY

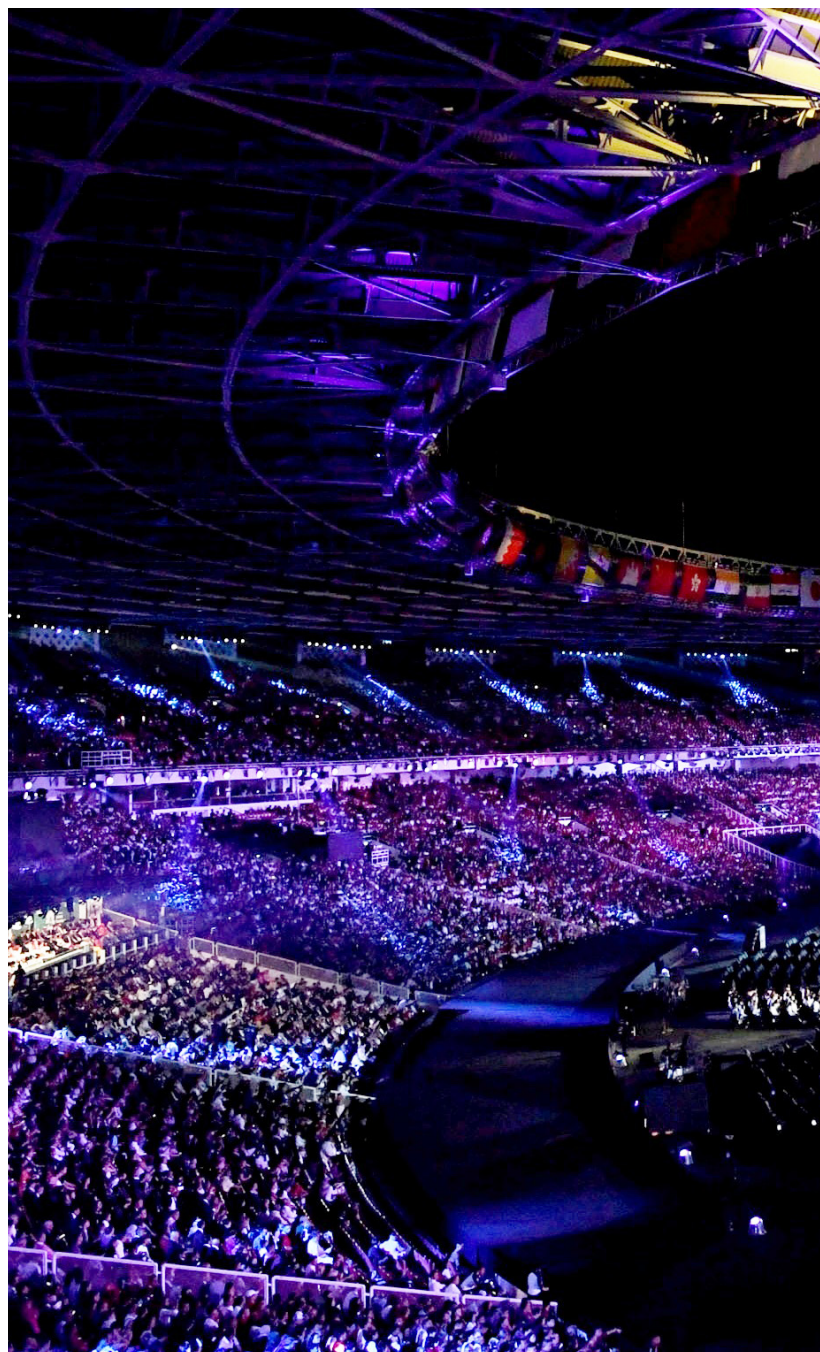
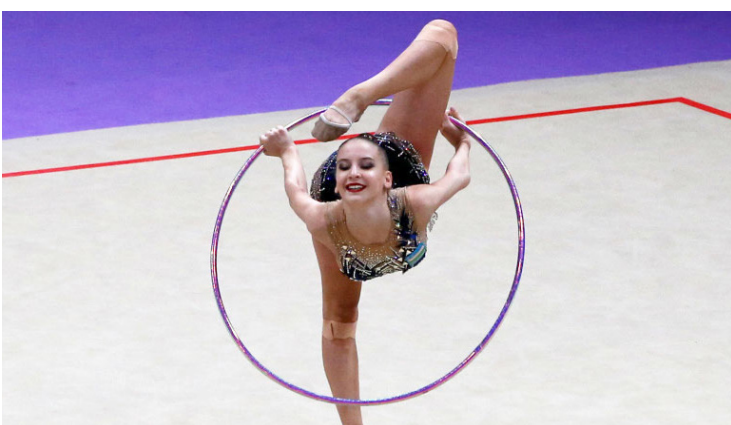

GOVERNMENT SUPPORT

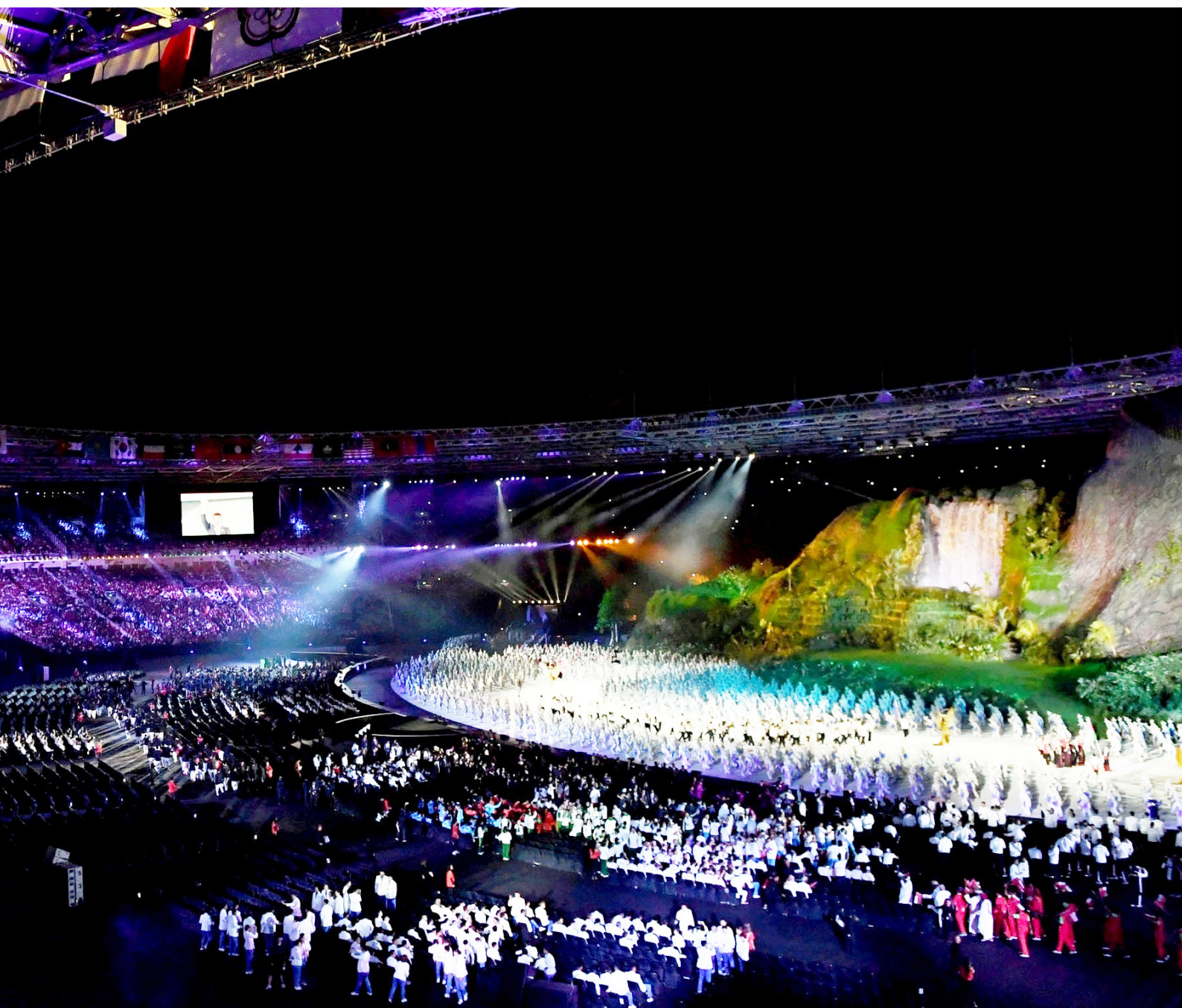

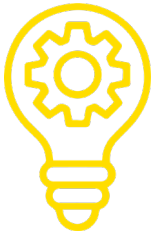

This Nation has Come a Long Way in its First 75 Years



Indonesia is a young country, with a median age of 29 and 60% of the population is under the age of 40, it represents a huge population of young, mobile savvy digital natives.

Indonesia is a country that contains great economic potential; a potential that has not gone unnoticed to the global community. Indonesia - Southeast Asia's largest economy - contains a number of characteristics that put the country in a great position for new advanced economic development.

Home to over 275 million people, Indonesia has some very significant facts:

- It's a young country. The median age is 29, and 60% of the population is 40 or under.
- It's one of the most mobile-first countries in the world: of the 202 million internet users in Indonesia, 95%, or 190 million, are mobile.
- 60% of all adult Indonesians now have smartphones.

Indonesia represents a huge population of young, mobile savvy digital natives. Indonesians spend 206 minutes a day on social media compared with the global average of 124.

Top platforms like Youtube, Whatsapp, and Facebook are used by more than 80% of online Indonesians. And 76% of all internet users in Indonesia make purchases from their phones, the highest rate of mobile e-commerce of any country in the world.

Indonesia is in a demographic dividend situation, where the majority of the population (approx. 180 million people) are of productive age

Being currently the 4th most populous country in the world, Indonesia is unique amongst the others: we are in a demographic dividend situation, where the majority of our people are of a productive age: about 2/3 of our population (equating to approx. 180 million people) are between 15-64 years of age.

This dividend bonus is a major force given the younger generation have access to decent education and facilities to improve their self-qualities. All indicators support the claim: our fertility rates are rising, mortality rates and illiteracy rates are declining and skilled workers now dominate the workforce.

Evidently, this demographic structure is reflected in the key new economic drivers on a global basis. We rank 4th highest amongst internet users and the millennials' creativity is most prominent in their contribution to the economy, manifested in the number of successful start-ups and unicorn companies that have emerged from these.

A Stable Economy with a Strong Domestic Consumption

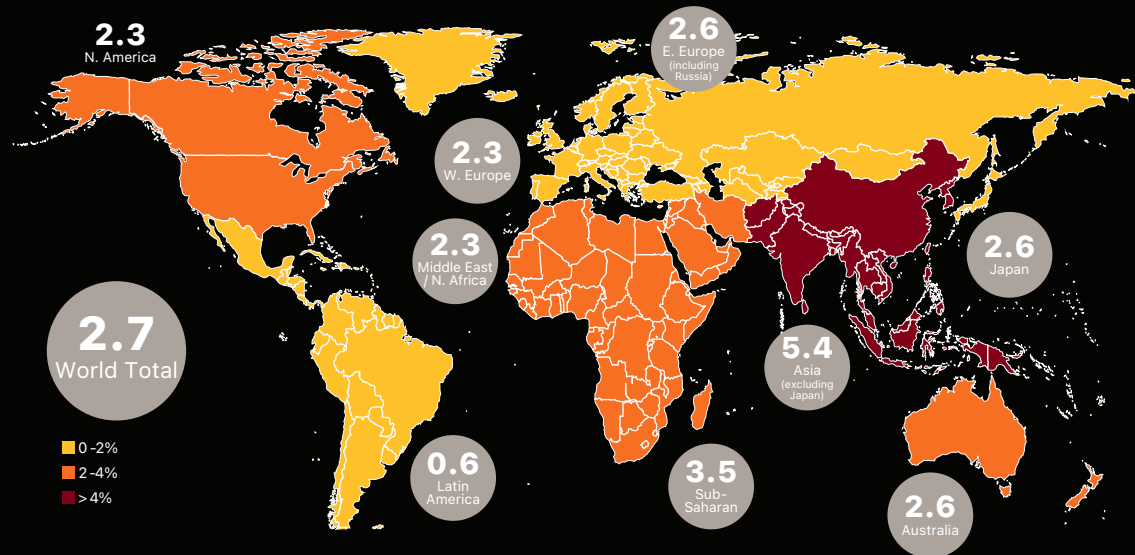


Domestic consumption is a huge source of continuous strong growth performance, resulting in an influx of Indonesians into the country's middle class.

The Indonesian economy is growing faster than the average country and more resilient against the crises. Today, 3 out of 5 of the world's biggest economic powerhouses are in Asia: China India and ASEAN.

Domestic consumption is a huge source of continuous strong growth performance. This solid economic growth has resulted in an influx of Indonesians into the country's middle class. Annually, around seven million Indonesians join the ranks of this middle class according to a world bank report released in 2012.

There is a trend, a megatrend, where economic growth and geopolitical considerations are shifting from west to east. A realignment of global economic and business activity is transitioning BRIC and other growth countries, including Indonesia, from centers of labor and production to consumption- oriented economies. As they become exporters of capital, talent, and innovation, the direction of capital flows is being adjusted.

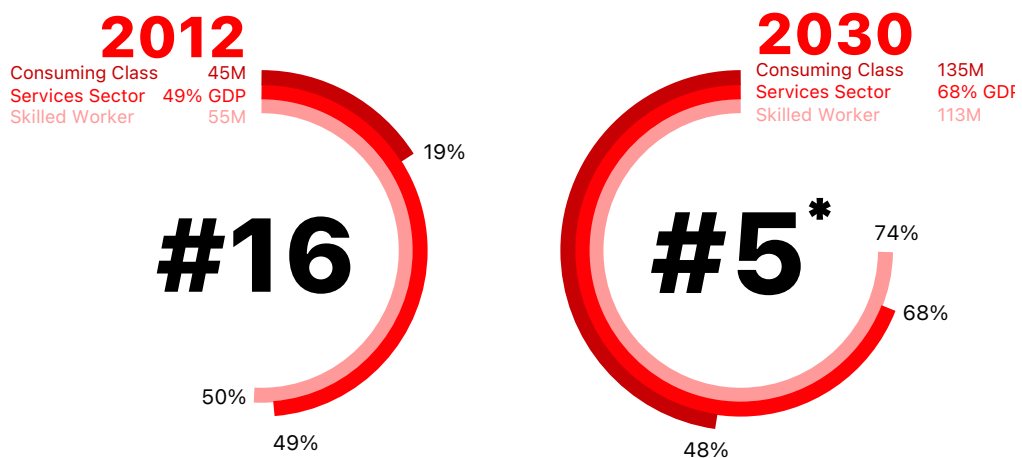


Indonesia Economy has been showing impressive resiliency and its GDP per capita has increased almost ninefold in the last 70 years.

Being South East Asia's biggest economy, and growing to be amongst the world's top 5 economies by 2030, Indonesia is well positioned to be the gravity of the region. Its economy has been showing impressive resiliency. Looking back 70 years, since 1950, average gross domestic product (GDP) per capita has increased almost ninefold in real terms, and the average Indonesian today enjoys a standard of living far surpassing that of previous generations.

In part, a more prosperous Indonesia today is due to the productivity benefits that arise from urban agglomeration and the associated transformation from an agrarian society to one more based on industry and services.

Indonesia is also blessed with endowments to stay ahead of the megatrend of future economic drivers. It is the biggest source of rare earth and battery source.



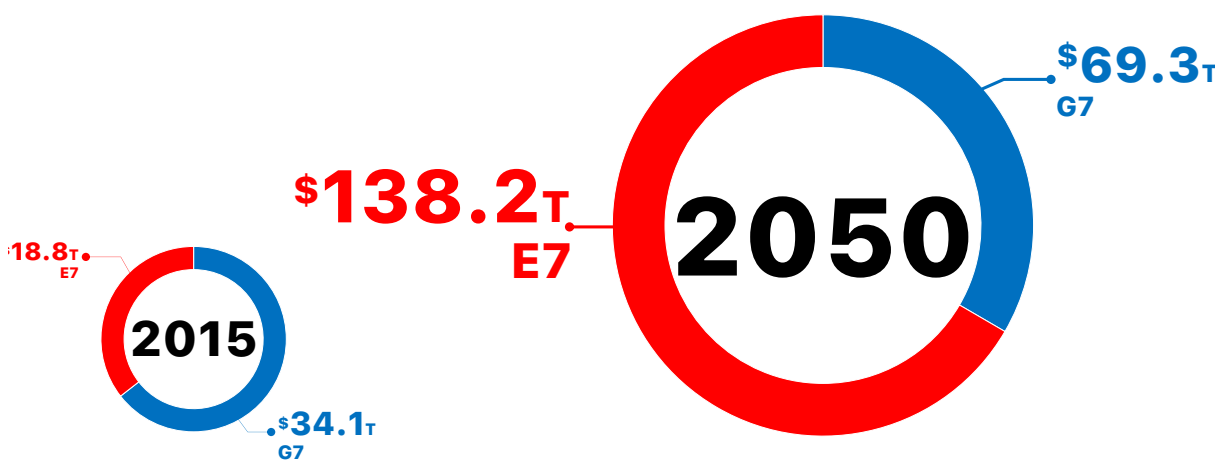

Today, global sourcing of battery materials, its upstream industry and the unprecedented tractions towards electric vehicle and clean energy use, is at its peak hour, as global key players are setting up their production base in Indonesia.

By 2050, the PWC report on key megatrends has projected that the existing E7 economies will outsize its G7 peers with a total economy

of 138 trillion. Undoubtedly, Indonesia, and the South East Asia economies for that matter, will constitute a large and significant part of the E7 economies.

Parallel to the promising economic potential, the ever growing consuming class will make Indonesia a powerhouse of the future. Our consuming class will be in excess of 135 million, and a projected supply of skilled workers of 135 million.

Indonesian Cities Excel In Embracing Urbanization



Today over half of the population lives in cities and towns; by 2045, the centenary of Indonesia's independence, nearly three-quarters will be urbanized, as it promises a better life.

As the world is growing at its highest rate of urbanization, Indonesia is no exception and will continue its growth- economically and geopolitically. Indonesia, the world's fourth most populous country, is becoming increasingly urban. Today over half of the population lives in cities and towns; by 2045, the centenary of Indonesia's independence, nearly three-quarters will. Urbanization promises a better life for Indonesians: around the world, major global cities are centers of economic prosperity and desirable places to work and live.

No large country has ever reached high-income status without also becoming urbanized.

Between now and 2030, there will be at least 70 million people transforming to become urban residents, and a creation of approximately 60 million new middle class. As a matter of reference, that's twice the population size of Australia today, or one new Italy!

There will be 22 major metropolises with over 1.5 million inhabitants plus one Jakarta megapolis, and an additional 100 cities on a similar growth trajectory.

With an over 135 million consuming class, urbanized and creation of 60 million new middle class in the process, supported by positive trend in foreign direct investments and vibrant economies, the market opportunity for the Games is significant.

Sustainability, positive thrust towards achieving SDG targets, and banking on the legacy impact of the games, will no doubt bring further acceleration to the growth potential.

It will bring together markets, young and affluent population, global and small medium companies alike, with an ever growing vibrant cities and communities.

Under optimistic and baseline scenarios of economic growth with an average of 5.7 and 5.1 percent until 2045, it is expected that Indonesia will become a high-income country within 18 to 20 years and the fifth to seventh largest economy in 2045.

The strategy to achieve this vision is built upon four pillars,

1. Human Development and Mastery of Science and Technology;
2. Sustainable Economic Development;
3. Equitable Development; and
4. National Resilience and Governance.

As this country transforms to an advanced economy, the performance is determined by the quality of human resources to make the most of our natural resources.

With a projected total population of 319 million in 2045 and urban population of about 73 percent, Indonesia will strive to become a high-income economy that is based on human capital.

With demographic bonuses that are estimated to still occur until 2045, Indonesia needs to anticipate urbanization problems and utilize the productivity from agglomeration to become economic drivers.

Indonesia has set a vision to become a developed country and one of the world's largest economy, that driven by investment and trade, industry, tourism, maritime, and services; as well as supported by reliable infrastructure and strong resilience on food, water, and energy.

As a country in an archipelagic setting, future development will rely on a maritime economy. The ocean in the future will not only become the means for connectivity and trade, but also will become the main source of food and energy.



Transjakarta: A Study in Success

Transjakarta is the longest BRT in the world – spanning nearly 244 km, serving millions in the Indonesian capital. It was the first BRT in South East Asia and planned to be all Electric by 2030. Transjakarta's popularity has helped transform Jakarta into a less car reliant city.

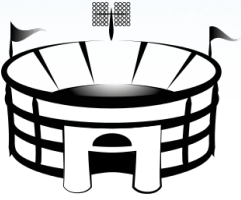


PENCAK SILAT

ORGANIZATIONS



INTERNATIONAL OLYMPIC COMMITTEE (IOC)

The International Olympic Committee is a non-governmental sports organisation based in Lausanne, Switzerland, it is the authority responsible for organising the modern Summer and Winter Olympic Games. The IOC is the governing body of the NOCs, which are the national constituents of the worldwide Olympic Movement.



CONTINENTAL ASSOCIATION OF NOC

A Continental Association of NOC is a recognized body by the IOC and it is the governing body of sports in its continent. One such association is Olympic Council of Asia (OCA), which is the apex sporting body which controls all the sports in Asia. It is one of the five continental associations recognized by the IOC.



NATIONAL OLYMPIC COMMITTEE (NOC)

NOC is a national constituent of the IOC. Subject to the controls of the IOC, NOCs are responsible for organizing their people's participation in the Olympic Games. They may nominate cities within their respective areas as candidates for future Olympic Games. NOCs also promote the development of athletes and training of coaches and officials at a national level within their geographies.



INTERNATIONAL SPORTS FEDERATION (IF)

The International Sports Federations are international non-governmental organisations recognised by the International Olympic Committee (IOC) as administering one or more sports at world level. IFs also responsible to organize international championships and competitions.

With regards to Olympic Games, IFs are responsible for the technical function, including among other: establishing the technical rule, establishing the results and ranking of Olympic competition, eligibility of participants.

IFs are responsible for the integrity of their sport on the international level.



CONTINENTAL CONFEDERATION OF SPORTS

Confederations are regional governing bodies of NFs located in the same continent. They are umbrella governing bodies for IFs in each continent. Confederation should adhere to the rules and regulations of the IFs, cooperate with its Continental Association of NOC, and to assist their member NFs.

They are responsible for competition and championship among member nations located in the continent.



NATIONAL SPORTS FEDERATION (NF)

The national federations (NF) is a sport governing body responsible for promoting the development of the sport in its country. The NF is affiliated to its IF and has to implement the rules and regulations set up by its IF. The NF makes up the primary membership of the IF.

POLICY & REGULATIONS



The National Olympic Committee of Indonesia is regulated by both the International Olympic Committee (IOC) and by the Government of Indonesia



IOC

IOC regulates the nature, mission, roles, responsibility, and the rights of National Olympic Committees as stated in the Olympic Charter, specifically:

1. Fundamental Principles of Olympism
2. Rules 27, 28, and 29
3. Bye-law to Rules 27 and 28



GOVERNMENT OF INDONESIA

The National Olympic Committee of Indonesia is governed by:

1. Act No. 3/2005 on the National Sport Management System
2. Government Ordinance No. 17/2007 on the Organization of Sporting Events and Competitions.
3. Presidential Regulation No. 95/2017 on the Improvement of the National Sports Achievement

ACT NO. 3/2005

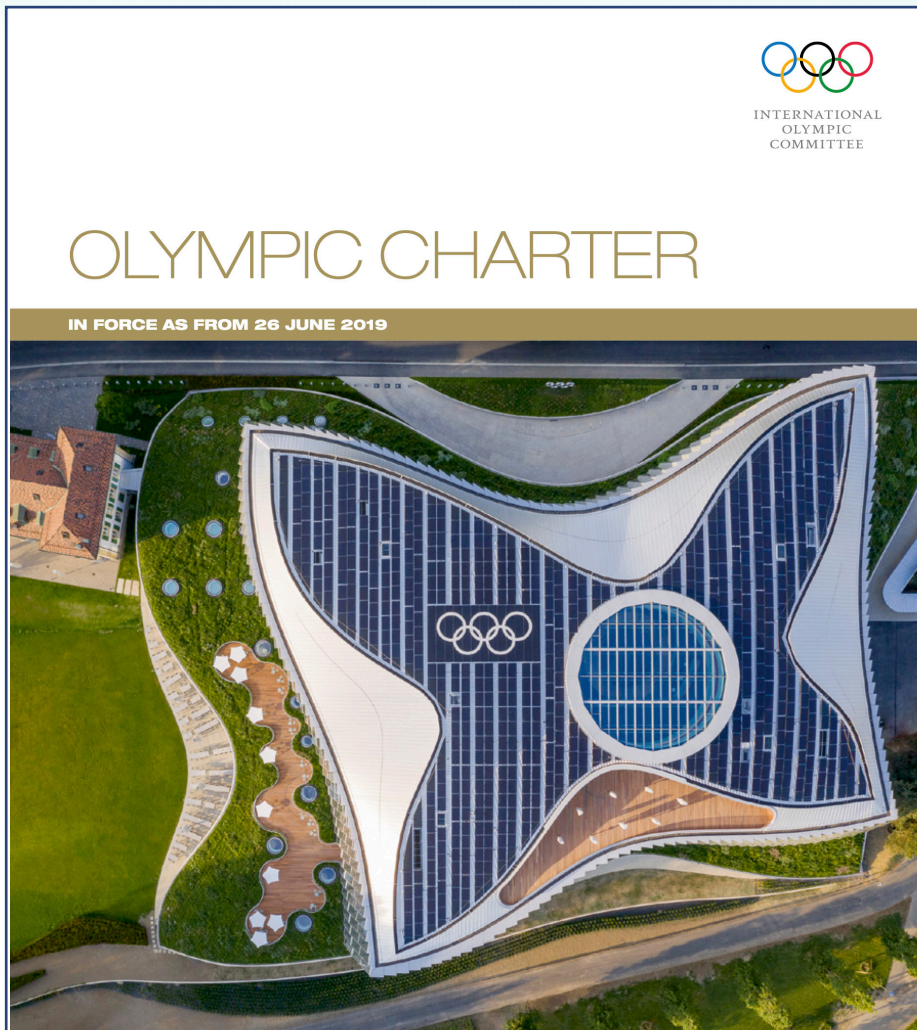
Article 44

1. Indonesia's participation in the international sports week as referred to in Article 43 point (d) is aimed at realizing world friendship and peace and at enhancing the nation's dignity through achievement.
2. Indonesia's participation as referred to in paragraph (1) shall be carried out by the Indonesian Olympic Committee or the National Olympic Committee as has been recognized by the International Olympic Committee .
3. The Indonesian Olympic Committee promotes and maintains Indonesia's interests, as well as obtains public support to participate in the Olympic Games, Asian Games, South East Asia Games , and other international sports weeks.
4. The Indonesian Olympic Committee works in accordance with the regulations of the International Olympic Committee, the Olympic Council of Asia, the South East Asia Games Federation , and other international sports organizations that are affiliates of the Indonesian Olympic Committee with due regard to the provisions of this Law.

Article 50

1. Indonesia's submission as a candidate to host the international sports week was proposed by the Indonesian Olympic Committee after obtaining approval from the Government.
2. The implementation of the international sports week as referred to in paragraph (1) shall be assigned to the Indonesian Olympic Committee.

OLYMPIC CHARTER



FUNDAMENTAL PRINCIPLES OF OLYMPISM

Recognising that sport occurs within the framework of society, sports organisations within the Olympic Movement shall apply political neutrality. They have the rights and obligations of autonomy, which include freely establishing and controlling the rules of sport, determining the structure and governance of their organisations, enjoying the right of elections free from any outside influence and the responsibility for ensuring that principles of good governance be applied.

RULE 27 MISSION AND ROLE OF THE NOCS

1. The mission of the NOCs is to develop, promote and protect the Olympic Movement in their respective countries, in accordance with the Olympic Charter.
2. The NOCs' role is:
 - 2.1 to promote the fundamental principles and values of Olympism in their countries, in particular, in the fields of sport and education, by promoting Olympic educational programmes in all levels of schools, sports and physical education institutions and universities, as well as by encouraging the creation of institutions dedicated to Olympic education, such as National Olympic Academies, Olympic Museums and other programmes, including cultural, related to the Olympic Movement;
 - 2.2 to ensure the observance of the Olympic Charter in their countries;
 - 2.3 to encourage the development of high performance sport as well as sport for all;
 - 2.4 to help in the training of sports administrators by organising courses and ensuring that such courses contribute to the propagation of the Fundamental Principles of Olympism;
 - 2.5 to take action against any form of discrimination and violence in sport;
 - 2.6 to adopt and implement the World Anti-Doping Code;
 - 2.7 to encourage and support measures relating to the medical care and health of athletes.
3. The NOCs have the exclusive authority for the representation of their respective countries at the Olympic Games and at the regional, continental or world multi-sports competitions patronised by the IOC. In addition, each NOC is obliged to participate in the Games of the Olympiad by sending athletes.
4. The NOCs have the exclusive authority to select and designate the interested hosts which may apply to organise Olympic Games in their respective countries.
5. In order to fulfil their mission, the NOCs may cooperate with governmental bodies, with which they shall achieve harmonious relations. However, they shall not associate themselves with any activity which would be in contradiction with the Olympic Charter. The NOCs may also cooperate with non-governmental bodies.
6. The NOCs must preserve their autonomy and resist all pressures of any kind, including but not limited to political, legal, religious or economic pressures which may prevent them from complying with the Olympic Charter.
7. NOCs have the right to:
 - 7.1 designate, identify or refer to themselves as "National Olympic Committees" ("NOCs"), which designation or identification shall be included or referred to in their name;
 - 7.2 send competitors, team officials and other team personnel to the Olympic Games in compliance with the Olympic Charter;
 - 7.3 benefit from the assistance of Olympic Solidarity;
 - 7.4 use certain Olympic properties as authorised by the IOC and in compliance with Rules 7-14 and BLR 7-14;
 - 7.5 take part in activities led or patronised by the IOC, including regional Games;
 - 7.6 belong to associations of NOCs recognised by the IOC;
 - 7.7 formulate proposals to the IOC concerning the Olympic Charter and the Olympic Movement, including the organisation of the Olympic Games;
 - 7.8 give their opinions concerning the candidatures for the organisation of the Olympic Games;
 - 7.9 participate, on request from the IOC, in the activities of the IOC commissions;
 - 7.10 collaborate in the preparation of Olympic Congresses;
 - 7.11 exercise other rights as granted to them by the Olympic Charter or by the IOC.
8. The IOC helps the NOCs fulfil their mission through its various departments and Olympic Solidarity.
9. Apart from the measures and sanctions provided in the case of infringement of the Olympic Charter, the IOC Executive Board may take any appropriate decisions for the protection of the Olympic Movement in the country of an NOC, including suspension of or withdrawal of recognition from such NOC if the constitution, law or other regulations in force in the country concerned, or any act by any governmental or other body causes the activity of the NOC or the making or expression of its will to be hampered. The IOC Executive Board shall offer such NOC an opportunity to be heard before any such decision is taken.

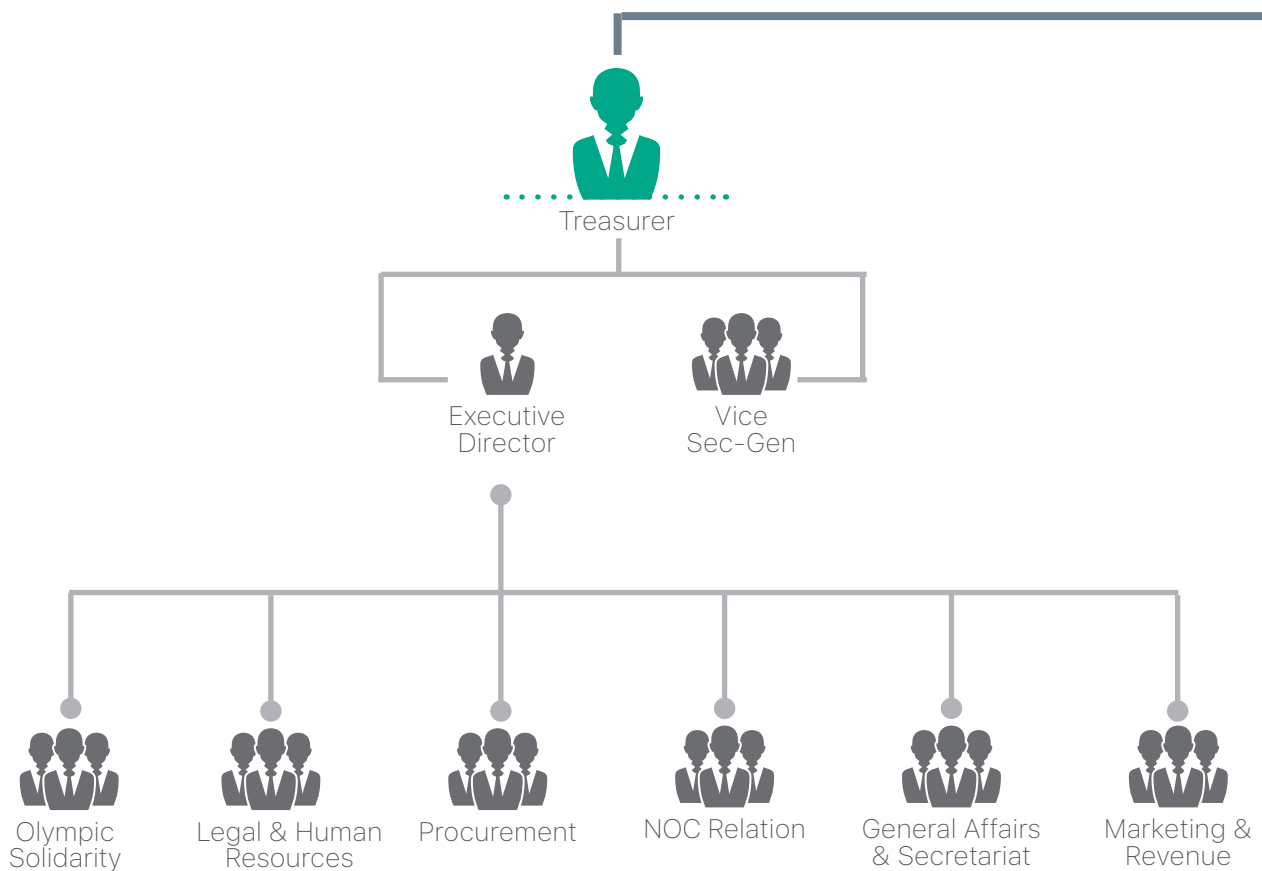


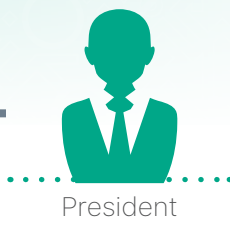

The Games will directly address more than 655 million people of world's biggest economy. It will bring about transformative innovations, new methods and means of promoting the Olympic Games as a product to "All People" around the world.

With new emergent, fully immersive virtual reality augmentations coming to the light of day, it is full conceivable that there is an impending convergence of credible, video-game or simulation-based e-sports which would capture the very imaginations of people with the physical prowess of the athletes and their exploits in the very same manner that people marvel at a Yelena Isinbaeva launch her body 5m into the air with but a pole. The Indonesia 2032 Olympic Games will attract a new group of corporate sponsors and suppliers into the Olympic Movement, sponsors and suppliers that get attracted because of the enormous opportunity. We will work together to create the story telling framework to strengthen the Olympic brand.

The vibrant economy is supported by a world class urban transportation system of the future. Featuring connectivity, easy access, energy efficient and smart mobility.

Today, new transit-oriented developments is developing along an efficient routes of public transport, a combination of MRTs, LRTs and efficient, extensive bus coverage. It's not only connecting residential areas to commercial and businesses, but more importantly for the game, its efficiently connects all the venues and sport facilities, health, retail and culinary centers.

Sustainability, positive thrust towards achieving SDG targets, and banking on the legacy impact of the Games, the 2032 Games will bring further acceleration to the growth potential.
